Minutes of the March Meeting

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Mary Sheridan had a Windows SIG from 6 PM until 6:30. At 6:30 the meeting was opened and club business was discussed.

At 7:00, Bruce Register induced our presenters. He explained that he had met Claire Emanuel at the FACUG Spring Conference and she had graciously agreed to do a presentation for us. Kevin Hunt was also on hand to help with the presentation.

Claire began the presentation by explaining that she represents a company called Tu.Be. Computers located in Englewood, FL. Tu.Be. Computers are distributors for many types of computers and computer related products. They are also the distributors for JR Inkjet. JR Inkjet is a seven-year-old British based company. JR Inkjet developed the Universal Refill Ink Kit. Their refill kits can be used with over 400 different types of cartridges. Claire showed a slide show explaining how to refill an ink cartridge. Make sure you refill your cartridge over a protected surface, like the sink or a counter top covered with paper towels because you might get a few drops leak out of the cartridge and you don't want to make a mess. Be careful how you handle the cartridge's print head. They are usually metallic and might be damaged if you touch them. Cartridges should be refilled when they aren't quite empty. When cartridges are allowed to dry out, they may not be useable anymore. The refill kits come with a flush, so if your cartridges have dried out, you can still possibly use them by first running the flush through the print heads. The flush kit will dissolve the dried ink. The starter kit that Claire had for sale contained two 20 ml bottles of black ink. The amount of times you can refill your particular cartridge with the starter kit depends on how much ink your cartridge holds. The kit comes with the primary colors, cyan, yellow and magenta. JR Inkjet offers the starter kits at a special price to

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Netgear 314 Gateway Router

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If you are using a cable or DSL connection to the Internet and have more than one computer, you need one of these routers. In the September 2000 newsletter (http://www.tpcug.org/newsletter/nl_2000/September2000/cable_router.htm), Larry Anders wrote about his good experience with the Linksys router. This month I am writing a similar laudatory article on the Netgear router with a four port 10/100 Mbps switch.

For several years, I have had a network connecting the four computers I and other family members use around the house. And, as described in an article in the April 2000 newsletter (http://www.tpcug.org/newsletter/nl_2000/april2000/comments200004.htm), I had even run extra cable so that I could connect the upstairs computer to the downstairs cable modem when I wanted more than a regular dial-up connection for that computer. But I had resisted the Microsoft Internet Connection Sharing feature of Microsoft Windows 98 SE and Windows Me since some aspects of it didn't appeal to me. Neither did the installation of proxy server software, which also allows you to share an Internet connection, which I

tried way back in 1997 and wrote about in an article in the December 1997 newsletter (<http://www.tpcug.org/reviews/december97.html>). But after Larry's article I began researching such routers and watching the pricing.

Last month when I stopped by CompUSA for some new antiviral software, I noted that they had the Netgear 314 router on sale for \$129, down from the usual \$169 by way of an instant \$20 rebate and a \$20 mail in rebate. So I could wait no longer.

The router's installation is basically very simple. Each of your computers that will be connected to it will need a network card. These cards need to each have Client for Microsoft Networks installed, as well as the TCP/IP protocol with the TCP/IP that is bound to your network card set to obtain its IP address automatically. This can all be achieved by a right click on the Network Neighborhood icon on the desktop (Network Places in Win Me) and then a click on Properties.

Next, to install the router, with everything powered down you connect your cable or DSL modem to the Internet port on the router, then connect the network cable from each of up to four computers to one of the four Local ports on the router. Finally you plug the router's power adapter into an AC outlet and then power everything up. Everything worked right out of the box for me with the exception that I couldn't see the files on one computer from the other computers. That problem was solved by enabling File sharing for that computer's drives.

The router dynamically assigns each computer on the network an address like 192.168.0.2, 192.168.0.3,.... The router itself has address 192.168.0.1, and you communicate with it via a Telnet to this address. When you do this Telnet you are presented with many menus which allow you to configure the setup in many ways. For example, if you want to be able to run a Microsoft NetMeeting session from a specific computer on the network, say, computer 192.168.0.2, then you will need to use Menu 15 to assign ports 1720 and 1503

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Easy CD Creator 5 Platinum Software Summary

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
The best just keeps getting better. Several years ago, when I got my first CD burner, Easy CD Creator (EZCD) came in the box with the burner. It was not the latest version, but it didn't take me long to realize this was to be a software package that I would become very familiar with. Because I had that older version of EZCD that came with my burner I was qualified to buy the upgrade, which I did, the same day I got my burner.

I put off purchasing my first burner for quite a while, mainly because of the cost, and also because it was a whole new world of computing that I knew nothing about. But they don't call it Easy CD Creator for nothing. Within 5 minutes of installing my first version I had burned my first CD. Now that's EASY!

Suffice it to say that Adaptec, which I guess now goes by the name of Roxio, has always tried to make EZCD your one stop shopping for CD burning software. And with version 5 Platinum they've gotten enough software to let you do things on CD that you probably never thought you would or could.

As I indicated in the title, this is more of a summary than a review. Here's what you get with Easy CD Creator 5 and some of the things you can do:

- **Easy CD Creator 5 Platinum (of course – but hold on to your hat!)** Easily creates data, audio and multimedia CDs on your PC.
- **SoundStream 2** Enhances the sound quality of MP3 files or records from analog (phonograph, tape or microphone) or digital sources while filtering out the pops, clicks and hisses. Loudness balancing for tracks from disparate sources. Save CDs to HD to create a virtual jukebox of compressed CDs on your computer.
- **Direct CD** Save directly to a CD as if it were a hard drive. Previously, this type of CD could only be read



by another CD burner using Direct CD but now it will automatically "make-writable" on eject so that basically any CD reader can read it.

- **Take Two** Use your CD-R/RW Drive to recover from hard disk disasters.
- **Spin Doctor** Turns your scratchy LPs into Digital quality CDs

(nearly).

- **CD Copier** Copy directly from one CD to another, but remember... if you don't own the rights, copying commercial CDs to sell or give away is illegal. Recordable CDs created with such material should be for personal use only.
- **VideoImpression** Easy to use video editing features such as trimming, combine, text overlay and transitions to video clips. Includes MPEG 1 video encoder to save video in the correct format for VideoCD Creator.
- **Photo Relay (which includes Photo Album and Video Postcard)** Make your own photo albums adding sound and narration or email video postcards that any PC can view without any special software.
- **VideoCD Creator** Become a Hollywood director and make your own videos with your very own multimedia studio. You can edit video clips, add text or apply transitions between scenes.
- **CD Label Creator** When you're all done creating, make your very own labels to cover your newly created CDs and CD cases.
- **Sound Editor** You not only have the ability to edit video but audio as well.
- **Session Selector** You don't have to burn a CD all at once any longer. Start it now and finish it later by starting a new session.
- **Web-CheckUp** With EZCD you're always assured of having the latest updates. Just go to the website and give yourself a check-up.

You can also download Internet music, including MP3 tracks, and record to your own CD's, create

Editor's Comments: Microsoft Windows Media Encoder, Adobe Atmosphere and Renegade Fonts

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Renegade Fonts Let's do the font bit first. In the June 1996 newsletter I mentioned a problem in Microsoft Access caused by the Hatten font installed with Microsoft Publisher 98. It was the first time I had run across the fact that having a certain font installed on your computer could cause a program to malfunction. I must admit that I don't understand how a "bad" font could cause a program to crash if the program doesn't use that font, and I don't think the program in question, NetMeeting, used any of the fonts I deleted to resolve the problem, since they were all dated before 1995.

Here's what happened. On a computer on which I had done a clean installation of Windows Millennium several months earlier, I decided to do a NetMeeting. On doing this, after NetMeeting had essentially loaded, I got the message "CONF caused a general protection fault in module GDI.EXE." If I closed out this message, NetMeeting would also close. If I just left the message up, then NetMeeting seemed to run sort of OK. There were problems, but they could conceivably be the fault of the other person in the meeting. A check of the Internet and Microsoft's site produced no mention of such a problem.

This past week, which was a couple of months later, I again tried out NetMeeting and received the same error message. However, this time much more seemed wrong. So, as I had done before, I went to Microsoft and downloaded the current version of the program and reinstalled NetMeeting. I also got the newest version of the Internet Explorer package and installed it. The error was still there.

I then searched the <http://www.dejanews.com/usenet> site (now redirected to Google) for that error message

and found out that others were now having the same problem and that Microsoft had said it was caused by incompatible fonts. I went to the article at Microsoft and found out that I needed to remove all fonts dated differently than the date on my Win.Com file and see if NetMeeting ran OK. I did this—and it did. So some program that I had installed had installed one or more fonts that NetMeeting didn't like.

To get as many fonts back as possible, I reinstalled them in blocks ordered by date until the problem reappeared. The problem returned when I added back fonts dated earlier than 1995. I didn't really care about any but two of these fonts, so I reinstalled these two, which caused no problem, and threw away those remaining before 1995.

I have left out a very important detail—how did I remove the fonts and then get them back? I will let you think about that for awhile. You might try it on one font and then think how well what you did would work for hundreds.

Windows Media Encoder Those of you who check your email or look at our main web page, <http://www.tpcug.org>, know that I put at our site several Windows Media Player files of audio versions of some of the articles in the March newsletter. It was an interesting experiment.

If you would like to record audio and/or video in Windows Media format, go to Microsoft and download the free Windows Media Encoder. It also allows you to change audio and video files in other formats to the Windows Media Player format.

Adobe Atmosphere, really Adobe Atmosphere Beta Builder and Browser plug-in, allows you to create 3D virtual interactive worlds and to view them in your browser. The builder and the browser plug-in can be downloaded for free from <http://www.adobe.com/products/atmosphere/main.html>. I am sure the browser plug-in will remain free, but in the release version the builder will be a retail product.

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As you may know, I have played with 3D virtual worlds before, and there is a “TPCUG Virtual Reality” link on our main page to prove it. That was done in a piece of software written by, I think, a company called Cosmo Software. Corel packaged Version 1 of the program with its WebMaster suite and called it CorelWeb.World back then. I later tried Version 2 of HomeWorld or some such name from Cosmo Software and almost had a much better TPCUG world created when my trial time period ran out. I didn’t love or need the program enough to purchase it, so the improved TPCUG Virtual Reality world never saw the light of day on the Internet.

The above mentioned 3D rendering for the Internet used a VRML plug-in for your browser. Now such technology is an integral part of Internet Explorer in its latest versions. Atmosphere, however, does not employ VRML but rather its own technology. That is why you need to download their Atmosphere plug-in to view worlds created in Adobe Atmosphere. So, do it right now. Go to <http://www.adobe.com/products/atmosphere/main.html> and get the browser plug-in. Once you have done that you can view my first attempt at http://home.netcom.com/~lamartin/aa1_test/first.htm. To see more professional examples, click on one of the Adobe book marked links that appear on your browser.

The image on this page is a screen capture of my



first world created with Atmosphere Builder. It is not very polished, but it gave me a chance to try out the program. You are viewing the scene from inside a tunnel. There is a photo gallery where you can view the photos on the walls. There are stairs to climb and portals that if entered will transport you to other 3D worlds. The man you see in the image is an avatar representing another visitor to the world other than yourself (you do not see the avatar representing you—however you can choose what it looks like and others visitors to the world will see him). There is a chat feature that allows you to chat with all other visitors to the world.

One feature I’ve done just a little with is the use of Java Script to make the world a little bit interactive. I have used this idea to play a sound when someone moves their mouse over a particular object and to jump to my web site <http://www.lamartin.com> when they move their mouse over a LaMartin.Com sign in the world.

Adobe hosts an Atmosphere discussion forum where you can ask for help and, as you get better at building worlds, give help. The Builder program really appeals to me, but, after getting my first world up and running, I am going to have to let it rest for awhile and get some other things done. ♦

Similar considerations exist for interactive games like Quake, or using a particular computer as a web or FTP server. To be able to use your computer for such purposes, you will have to assign certain ports to a particular computer and possibly remove certain default filters that are implemented in the default setup of the router. There is a very detailed manual in Adobe Acrobat format that describes how all of

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user groups of \$29.00. The kit also comes with a syringe and plugs needed for some cartridges. The kit retails for \$45.00. You save money by being a member of the user group.

You can save approximately \$160.00 by using the starter kit to refill their cartridges if you buy a new ink cartridge every time the inks runs out They also have a black refill kit with only black ink. It comes with everything the starter kit has except the flush. Another kit that they sell is the color kit. It has cyan, magenta, and yellow inks, the syringe and plugs, but flush. All kits come with complete instructions on how to refill your cartridges. Most people who buy the starter kits then buy the larger bottles of refill ink. They have a 16 ml bottle of black ink and a 250 ml bottle. JR Inkjet has a lot of repeat customers. They have a toll free help line for any problems or questions you may have. Most cartridges have sponges

inside, so you are refilling the sponge with ink. The color cartridge has three chambers with sponges. The ink is water-soluble and can be cleaned up with soap and water. The kit contains a tiny hand drill in case you need to make a hole in your cartridge, depending on the type of cartridge you have. JR Ink is dye based as opposed to pigment-based ink. Their ink is the highest formula ink. It is refined to 1/2 a micron to fit through the smallest ink jet. JR Inkjet is in the process of trying to get into the retail market. They are selling the kits on the Home Shopping Network. JR Inkjet was the first refill ink company. As long as you refill the cartridge before the sponges get dried out, you should be able to refill a cartridge ten times before you have to replace it. Printer Companies will often make their money on the consumables like the ink cartridges instead of the printers themselves. The inkbottles will last for a couple of years until they're opened. 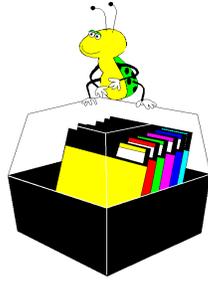
