**Minutes of the April Meeting**

Mary Sheridan, Member at Large, started the Windows SIG portion of our meeting at 6:40 pm. President Kevan Sheridan was not present. Mary raised a recent experience she had with her Toshiba laptop. The cooling fan failed, and she was unable to find a local parts house or dealer who stocked the part. She had to order the part from New York at a cost of \$44 plus \$36 for shipping. She asked why this is? Merle Nicholson explained that laptops and notebooks are comprised of proprietary components to minimize space and are sold in a very competitive market. These components are not interchangeable and the situation is not likely to change in the foreseeable future.

Several questions were asked about printing out system information, however your Secretary was distracted by the arrival of the evening's presenters and did not comprehend the questions.

At 7:20 pm our program presenters, Kelly Whitelock and Tony Hills were introduced. Kelly and Tony are affiliated with the Mormon Church, and their topic was entitled "Bringing Genealogy To Life". Packets were handed out, which included Pedigree Charts, Family Group Record forms, a Research Log, a list of items to consider in writing your personal history, and a Five-step Procedure for researching your ancestry.

Step One of the procedure was to record what you already know about your family. Step Two was to decide what you want to learn about your family. Step Three was to select the records you will search. It was suggested you first search compiled records (previous research by others), then search original

article for this newsletter, but it is so different from Microsoft FrontPage, which I have used for years for web work, that I would have had to drop everything else to find enough time. Perhaps by the next newsletter I will have had time to learn it better.

However, right off the bat, I can tell you that it will not be easy for someone who has not used Adobe products before and is familiar with the FrontPage way of doing things. I have used many Adobe products, but I am having a bit of trouble with it. It appears geared to those who are versed in Adobe's graphical programs. My hope is not to master it so as to use it to manage web sites, but to use it to create graphically rich web pages, since graphics is what Adobe is all about. Then I can bring those pages into my already existent sites.

Two things of note are that GoLive CS2 is now out, so I no longer have the latest version, and in doing a little research on the product I discovered some discontent among users that database connectivity was dropped from the product starting with the CS version. For me that is no problem since I have never used the database connectivity wizards in FrontPage, preferring to roll my own by using Visual Basic script and Active Server Pages, or by using ASP.Net to interface with a database. So, stay tuned to see if I learn enough about the program to write a review. However, that may be a waste of time, since I recently read that Adobe is to purchase Macromedia, the developer of the Dreamweaver web development program, and that may portend a dropping of GoLive in favor of Dreamweaver.

In a different direction, I have also presented two of my **Visual Basic.Net** programs at recent SIGs: One written for the Pocket PC which performs a simple slide show; the other written as a desktop application which allows you to add a time stamp on any photo taken with a digital camera, so that when printed the date and/or time would be visible on the print in whatever position you selected. I could go into a bit of detail about how one does such things. In particular, in the time stamp application I needed to retrieve the date and time a digital photo was taken from what is know as the **EXIF information** in the header

of the jpeg file for the photo. By the way, member Merle Nicholson requested the Pocket PC program and member Ron Weinberg requested the time stamp program.

To finish, I will write briefly about what sort of information goes into the EXIF section of the header. You have camera information, such as Make & Model; you have exposure information, such as Aperture and Shutter speed (listed as Exposure below); and certainly you have the date, which started this programming effort.

Below are the data that I extracted from a photo I took recently. The only thing not put there by the camera when the photo was taken is the Title, which I added using Adobe Photoshop's File Browser feature.

My Nikon D100 actually creates 59 fields in the header of the image file where for this photo it recorded data in 50 of them. As you can count above, I searched for and extracted only 12 such fields.

VB.Net has methods for extracting this information. However, once it is extracted you then need to know the data type of a particular field to be able to use its information. It turns out that the type could be ASCII, short, rational, long or undefined. To find the data type of a particular field, you need to consult the Exchangeable Image File Format (EXIF 2.2) for digital still cameras of the Japan Electronics and Information Technologies Industries Association (JEITA), which I found in English through a Google search at the Kodak site. Isn't programming useful?◆



records (birth, marriage, death and census records). Step Four, you should obtain a copy of the records you find and look for facts and clues, recording the results in a log. Finally, Step Five, use and share information you find. When you reach this point, select a new objective based upon what you now know about your family.

Kelly Whitelock instructed us on the use of records at public libraries and outlined the information contained on a page of a census survey. Don't expect to see a census record done within the last 76 years, as, to protect the privacy of the living, this information is not made available. I guess after age 70 you should have nothing to hide, or, having burned the candle at both ends, you are expected to have "kicked the bucket" by then.

Some members reported receiving BETA WINDOWS 95 (\$39). One member reported "running 16 bit and will not change to 32 bit until the final release of WINDOWS 95 comes out."

SOFTWARE VENDOR DEMONSTRATION-Comments and statements are:

Mr. Hartley Macklin, Manager of User Group Relations, Delrina Corporation, presented Delrina's several existing and new to-be-released programs. He made an excellent "discount offering" to TPCUG members. "Delrina is the leader in communication and forms products. Delrina has 650 employees in five countries and will be hiring an additional 150 within the next 60 days. Delrina can send out 10,000 faxes for you anywhere in the country. WinFaxPro can be used to download a fax that is awaiting you in your FaxMailBox. This is a Delrina service."

Delrina has Communications Suite "Strategy" (WinFaxPro and WinComPro) for stand alone applications. They are for the mainstream market, i. e., Windows 95 & Macintosh. Applications for OS/2 will be in the future as OS/2 users increase to 20,000,000. WinComPro is for Bulletin Boards. Delrina "is getting a toehold on the Internet." They have Internet Messenger. WinComPro provides for Internet E-Mail. Echo Lake is soon to be released for consumer programs. It is a Scrapbook application for biography, photos, etc.

Hartley gave a BETA copy of Echo Lake to the TPCUG Editor for review. He donated several software products to the TPCUG door prize program. He said, "If you can print it in Windows, you can fax it with WinFaxPro. There are no exceptions regardless of the application. Faxing from DOS will not work. It must be a Windows application that will print in Windows. He demonstrated the ease of use with Microsoft Word, whether faxing to one or to several recipients. You can select style and other features. You can "grab, drag and drop" from one phone book to another. In addition, mail can be sent to those in the address book who are selected to receive mail.

WinFaxPro has menu and tool bars. The "item log" manages the folders with choices and icons. Right mouse button capabilities speeds use. WinFaxPro "Viewer" cleans up fax "dirt" from faxes; it will even add your signature. You can doodle on your fax or draw on it, etc. He demonstrated using OCR. He took Microsoft Word, created a fax and turned the fax back to Microsoft Word. You can hook up any TWAIN scanner and scan a printed document and fax it from WinFaxPro. He says the current WinFaxPro is a tremendous improvement over WinFaxPro 3.0.

Delrina PerForm Designer for Windows was released in December 1994. "It is so easy to use; it is a 'form for idiots' ". It shows you what you see before you get it. It is easy to put in your logo just like you did your signature. The special to TPCUG members present that night only was \$39; not the suggested retail price of \$129. He presented several other special "one night only" offerings. Several of us took advantage of them.


