LP to CD Following last month's presentation on Audio Visual duplication, I decided to restart my long-lapsed program of transferring some of my LPs to digital files which could then be put on CDs. I had done this for a few LPs many years back and recalled it was a bit tedious, so I asked Merle Nicholson if he had any suggestions. He said, "Do you have Easy CD Creator?" Well, yes, I have Roxio Easy Media Creator. He said to check and see if they didn't have some software for working with LPs. And they did. It is Roxio LP and Tape Assistant.

After that, everything was fairly easy. I simply connected two RC cables from the output of my very old (1968) KLH stereo system with an integrated turntable to an adapter that plugged into the stereo line-in jack of my computer's sound card. Next I started the Roxio software, started the LP playing and let the software determine the proper recording levels. Next, I restarted the LP and let

D-Link Wireless-G Internet Camera Model DCS-G900

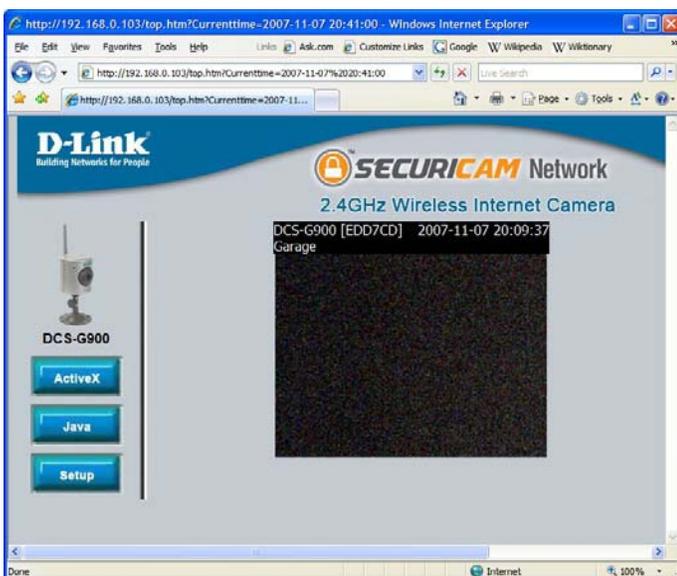
This is a camera you can place anywhere in range of your wireless router. You can then monitor the picture from any computer on your network. It's very easy to set up, and, other than the power cube, there are no wires to run.

My wife, Valerie, and I have wanted some way to monitor our detached garage for many years, and this appeared on sale at NewEgg, so I looked into it. I rely very heavily on the user reviews there in making my buying decisions. I looked at others, more expensive and cheaper, too. This one had very good reviews.

To understand how this guy works, you have to understand that it has a web server built in. It generates its own web pages, and all you do is connect to it with a browser – I use IE 7. It couldn't be simpler.

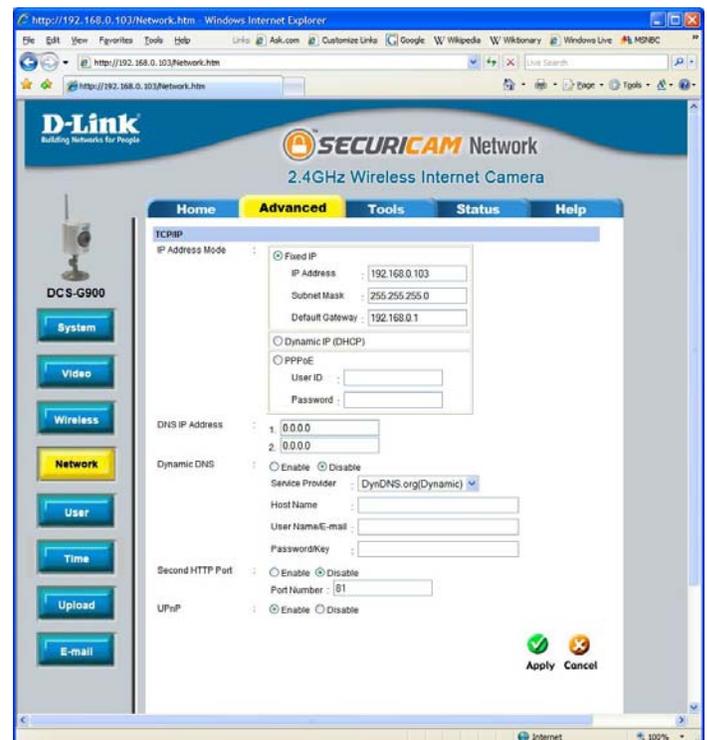
Some people program their router to expose the camera to the Internet, and, as long as you know your router's IP address, you can watch the cat tear up the couch from work! Or see that your hamster really sleeps all day.

I haven't any reason to watch it away from home. But if I did -- what I really like about it is that it isn't connected to a computer. You need the router and the webcam on, and that's it.



To set it up, you just plug it in and run the installation program. You'll connect to the camera's home page and select the setup, then you need to program the webcam with the router's SSID and whatever encryption key you use. Your wireless router DOES have encryption, doesn't it? You don't want your neighbor kid camping on your router to do his BitTorrent download of the latest Spiderman movie, do you?

When the SSID and encryption are set, the picture will start up using its default resolution and frame rate. You can set the resolution to 160x120, 320x240 or 640x480. You can set a data compression rate and frame rates in Frames/Sec of 1, 5, 7, 15, 20 and 30. There are brightness, contrast and saturation controls.



Other settings are available to FTP a picture to an FTP site at scheduled intervals, and there are email settings where you can set your SMTP server address and email address, and it will email a snapshot to you at intervals that you choose.

To view the picture in the browser, it will download an activex plug-in for your browser. There's an alternative Java plug-in, too. These install from the camera web server.

There is a stand-alone program, IPVIEW, that installs from the CD which takes up less screen real estate than a browser. This camera viewer can zoom in and out and also capture snapshots to a JPG file. Its main attraction is that you can view multiple cameras – up to four – in split screen. You don't need this program to view the camera, but it does have some real functions that compelled me to install it on one computer in my house. The others just use Internet Explorer.

With IPVIEW, there's a control panel that will scan your network for the cameras, so you don't need to assign a fixed IP address. From this control panel there are numerous setup options, including an alarm based on motion that will send an email, and there's a recording option.

I've had it running for a month now. I have the application running continuously on my server machine that runs continuously anyway, and I'll set up an email or FTP to my website based on motion when we are out of town. In the meantime, it's there to check if the garage door is down, the garage lights off and the cars are there with their interior lights off. And that the bicycle hasn't yet fallen on my Honda. We like it; it's inexpensive, has a minimal footprint on the computers and easy to set up.

Print or Write Labels

I was late in recognizing the utility of Avery's "Print or Write" labels. There are approximately 60 varieties of these labels. Some of the 60 labels represent a different color of the same label, plus you can get permanent or removable versions of some labels, and they even have a gold notarial seal to certify awards. They come in 4x6 sheets and usually cost between \$3.00 and \$6.00 per package. There is one 3x5 label per page (40 per package) and twenty-seven 1/2"x 7/8" labels per page (945 per package). This format is an excellent alternative to buying packages costing \$15.00 - \$30.00 when you only need a few labels of a particular size.

They are also handy if you only need to write or print one or two labels when you add a folder to your filing system or you want to label a magazine case or the AC adapter to your latest toy.

Avery offers some excellent free software that you can use with these and all other Avery products. You can pick from six options offered by Avery. One option allows you to edit on the web and print from there. A table to assist you in picking the product that best fits your needs is found at:

Page to Assist in Selection of Software

The "Avery Wizard for Microsoft Word" is probably the most versatile and easiest to use if you have Microsoft Office (or only Microsoft Word) and you print a fair amount of labels. The Wizard will appear in the Tools menu of Microsoft Word, Excel, Access and Outlook. I have only merged from Access. The merge with Access was easy to set up, and I imagine that merging with Excel would be even simpler. The Wizard software currently available for download contains Christmas designs that you can use to embellish your labels and cards. I also merged with an Access data base using the "Avery DesignPro Software" to print name tags on the normal format label. Again it was easy to setup, and it printed just as designed.

At the other end of the spectrum are the blank and pre-designed templates that you can download for the products that you are using. You can print single- or full-page labels, and it is easy to print additional labels at a later time on the page if you are printing less than a full page.

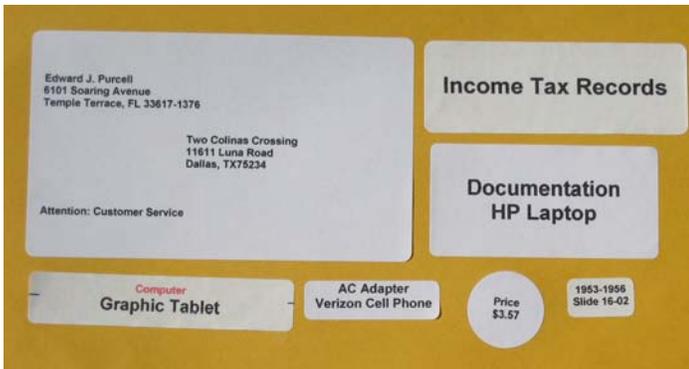

Roxio record the first side of the LP. That done, I stopped the software, flipped the LP and repeated the process. That resulted in an approximately 40-minute sound file.

The next thing to be done was to use the software to examine the resulting waveform and select where the track breaks occurred if the software hadn't already found them. I then entered names for each track along with an album name, musicians and date. The final step was burning everything to CD. I can now listen to music recorded by Louis Armstrong in the 1950s and '60s in my car and see the name of the song displayed in the car's information window. I have done about six albums so far. It really is quite easy after you have done one.

Census by Zip My latest programming project was to find a source of 2000 census data and build an application that will provide that data for whatever zip code you enter. You can see it at <http://www.lamartin.com> under the Useful Things link. I got the idea from <http://www.zipskinny.com>. ♦

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shop in this area was Video Corner in Tyrone Mall.

They started doing DVD duplication in 2001/2002 and currently have 64 DVD drive towers and 152 VHS duplicating machines. They also transfer video from mini DVD tapes, 8 mm and Super 8 mm movie film and 35 mm slides. Video can be put on VHS or DVD. For example, at funeral services they do memorial video shows from photographs. They also provide a service for recovering images from digital memory cards. Finally, they do web site design and sell or rent all types of video products. Ken handed out packets on equipment they provide.

Someone asked the price for converting color slides to DVD. Setup is \$25 and \$1 per slide, or \$2 per slide if color correction is desired. On movie film conversion, every foot is monitored to assure the best quality possible. They do lots of movie film.

Ken then answered a few questions and offered opinions on plasma and LCD televisions. His preference is still rear projection for large screen television.

John thanked Ken for his presentation and noted our sizeable audience as an indication of the interest in the program. He then called attention to free trade magazines Ken had brought in and free used P C cabling and devices being offered by William LaMartin.

The meeting adjourned at 8:37pm. ♦
